CALL TO ORDER: Mayor Myers called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

INVOCATION – The Reverend Ted Stackpole, Senior Pastor; First Assembly of God

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE – Don Gooding, with assistance from Mayor Myers

APPROVAL OF MINUTES – 1/29/13 Workshop – Commissioner Norwood moved to adopt the minutes as read. Commissioner Leary seconded the motion, which passed unopposed.

1. PUBLIC RECOGNITION/PRESENTATIONS:

PROCLAMATION: 67th Annual Azalea Festival Days - March 1 through 3, 2013 – Sam Deputy, Azalea Festival Chair, was present to receive the proclamation, which was read and issued by Mayor Myers. Mr. Deputy said they are looking forward to a good weekend and good crowd and they hope everyone will make an effort to attend. Mayor Myers noted the Committee people work hard all year long to bring this Festival to Palatka. Mr. Deputy distributed Festival T-shirts to members of the Commission.

2. PUBLIC COMMENTS:

Askew Vickers, 207 N. 18th Street, said he's here to address wants and needs. The Golf Course is a "want." Tearing down the Highrise is a "want." The walkway under the bridge is a "want." The "needs" are replacement of water lines. The water is not fit for consumption. The City needs to spend taxpayer money on improving the water system.

- 1(b) **BUDGET SUMMARY REPORT** – Matt Reynolds, Finance Director – There was consensus of the Commission to move this item to the regular meeting. Mr. Reynolds said he would take comments or questions on his report (filed). Mayor Myers commended Mr. Reynolds on the succinctness and depth of knowledge shown in his report.

3. CONSENT AGENDA:

- h. **Approve special request items for Special Events Permit #13-17** – Palatka Main Street -
 1. Allow sales/consumption of alcoholic beverages on public property/right-of-way on 100 Block of Reid Street for "Outdoor Movie" event on April 20, 2013 from 6:00 pm to 10:00 pm;
 2. Approve request to exceed allowable noise levels on April 20 for 100 Block Outdoor Movie Event from 6:00 pm to 10:00 pm and April 21 for Amphitheater Sunrise Service from 6:30 am – 8:00 am

Commissioner Kitchens asked to pull items 3(f), 3(g) and 3(h) for discussion. Commissioner Leary moved to approve all other items on the Consent Agenda as recommended. Commissioner Norwood seconded the motion, which passed unopposed.

- 3(f). Approve re-sale, service and consumption of alcoholic beverages at the Palatka Municipal Golf Course** on Sunday, March 10 and Sunday, March 17 from 7:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. for the Palatka Regular and Senior Azalea Golf Tournaments, per City Manager/City Attorney Recommendation - Commissioner Kitchens said she wanted to clarify that the City Attorney is not making a recommendation on this item; rather he recommended this come to the Commission for approval. She stated the Municipal Code does not allow alcohol sales on Sunday mornings. She does not believe the Golf Course should be treated any differently than any other business. This sets a bad precedent.

Commissioner Leary said the Golf Course Committee met today and unanimously supports this recommendation. The City is losing a tremendous amount of beverage and food sales by not allowing the on-premises sale of alcoholic beverages at the Golf Course on Sunday mornings. Golfers are bringing coolers onto the Course and they are drinking.

Andy Hartz, 145 Brittany Lane, Palm Coast, Course General Manger, said the Senior Azalea is a big event; there are 104 participants coming in from out of town. That Sunday morning there are probably close to 200 people on the course. Last year they didn't stick around after play; they packed up and went across the bridge so they could drink alcoholic beverages. This is an opportunity for the Course to make money. The Course is losing several thousand dollars each Sunday morning they can't serve.

Commissioner Kitchens said she recommends the city enforce the law on the golf course. She realizes golf course revenue is an ongoing problem. If it's going to take allowing service of alcoholic beverages on Sunday mornings to get the Golf Course out of the hole, she recommends the City divest itself of the Course.

Commissioner Norwood said they spent many months working on changes to the alcohol ordinance and helping businesses adjust their business hours. The City should adhere to its own ordinances. He does not understand why people need to begin drinking at 7 am.

Commissioner Leary said he doesn't know why people do what they do. Some people get up and go to the gym at 5 am, but he does not. Times change. If they try to stop people from drinking on the golf course, they may as well shut the course down. They are trying to transition the course to be more professional. This is on-premises sales. Every golf course in NE Florida allows this. They have a 3-year plan to turn this golf course around. They need to re-evaluate this to allow on-premises consumption on every Sunday. This is one of the highest-traffic on rounds for any day of the week. Mr. Hartz concurred. Commissioner Leary said Palatka is going to be showcased during the Azalea Tournaments. These players get in their cars and drive across the bridge to spend their money after play is over. He'd like to see the ordinance amended.

Commissioner Kitchens said these changes were made based upon studies. The problem is not golfers drinking on Sunday mornings; the problem is other bars wanting to serve in the Downtown area, where many churches are located. She has had multiple calls from citizens on this issue.

Mayor Myers asked Mr. Holmes if this establishes precedent. Mr. Holmes said this establishes precedent for the golf Course. The Commission is allowed to grant special permission for alcohol consumption in public areas. There is no exception allowing the Commission to grant permission to a private business to sell alcohol in a private licensed establishment. This is being made under Code Section 10-4, subparagraph b, which defines the application to public areas. This says permission can be granted for a special event, not every Sunday morning. There is no apparent restriction on time; the Commission can allow service of alcohol for areas that meet this definition. This establishes precedence as to the golf course and special events, but not for any business. The Golf Course is a recreation area.

Mr. Czymbor said he wasn't here when the Code was amended. This is a national golf tournament, is highly publicized and is a very prestigious tournament. The golfers will expect to be able to consume alcohol. This course is under tremendous financial distress. If this can raise \$2,000 in net sales to go towards the bottom line, that is that much less the taxpayers have to absorb. Mayor Myers said if these golfers were at any other course in the State of Florida, they would be legally drinking alcohol on Sunday morning.

Commissioner Leary moved to approve Consent Item 3(f) to allow Sunday morning on-premises sales and consumption of alcoholic beverages at the Palatka Golf Club during the Azalea and Senior Azalea Tournament weekends. Commissioner Norwood seconded the motion.

Sharon Buck, 610 S. 14th Street, objected, saying one of these is a senior tournament. Moseley has many curves and is dangerous for drivers. This is a safety issue. She believes this is inappropriate.

Commissioner Norwood said this is something they can do on a trial basis; he asks that if there are any reports concerning this issue, they be reported to the commission. There being no further discussion, the motion passed three in favor, opposed by Commissioner Kitchens.

3(g). Approve special request items for Special Events Permit #13-09 for the 60th Annual Mug Race – Palatka Yacht Club, applicant; May 3, 2013 from 4:30 pm to 9:00 pm:

1. Allow sales/consumption of alcoholic beverages on public property/right-of-way – 2nd Street east to Riverfront and along Memorial Drive/River Street south to Boathouse Marina
2. Approve request to exceed allowable noise levels

Commissioner Kitchens said last year the alcohol was served under a tent. During Blue Crab the Presbyterian Church was assured that there would be no adverse affects from the drinking, but there was litter from the drinking. She objects to allowing drinking around the Church. She thinks the area where drinking is allowed should be smaller. She had a complaint from a citizen that Palatka is advertising street parties in Downtown Palatka on a billboard on I-95.

Commissioner Leary said they can ask the Yacht Club to clean up all the trash prior to church services on Sunday morning. He thinks this is a worthwhile event. Mayor Myers said the City sees this as an opportunity to revitalize participation in the Mug Race. Last year this was a huge success; sailors and merchants enjoyed it.

Commissioner Norwood said this is too broad an area. Mayor Myers said many of the boats are going to be at the public dock and the Boathouse Marina. This will enable boaters to walk back and forth from their boat to the entertainment and oyster roast area. They want Palatka to be an enjoyable destination. Last year there were no issues with this event.

Jeff Norton, Parks Department, said this was approved for the same area last year. Mayor Myers said they ran the Trolley up and down St. Johns Avenue so everyone could access the downtown restaurants. Boaters were very complimentary of Palatka. It was a well-behaved crowd.

Commissioner Leary moved to pass Consent Agenda Item 3(g), parts 1 and 2, to approve alcoholic beverages sales/consumption and grant permission to exceed allowable noise levels for the 60th Annual Mug Race per the request. Commissioner Norwood seconded the motion, which passed upon a vote of three in favor, opposed by Commissioner Kitchens. Commissioner Kitchens stated she supports the Mug Race.

- 3(h). Approve special request items for Special Events Permit #13-17 – Palatka Main Street, Appl.**
1. Allow sales/consumption of alcoholic beverages on public property/right-of-way on 100 Block of Reid Street for "Outdoor Movie" event on April 20, 2013 from 6 pm to 10 pm;
 2. Approve request to exceed allowable noise levels on April 20 for 100 Block Outdoor Movie Event from 6:00 pm to 10:00 pm and April 21 for Amphitheater Sunrise Service from 6:30 am – 8:00 am

Commissioner Kitchens said she had this item pulled for three reasons. They don't know how many people will come to this. This is being planned in conjunction with the "mass class reunion" for Palatka South and Central. According to the Facebook page, 791 invitations have gone out for this event. There is a lot of new landscaping behind the 100 Block. She's had phone calls from citizens that do not want this. They don't want drinking at this event; there will be antique cars there and people can't sit in their cars and drink. This is billed as a family event. She noted this is Main Street's 3rd event for the year, and Mr. Rudd will need to go through another non-profit for further permits.

Police Chief Getchell said the PD's Ops Plan is built around the event without the Mass Class Reunion. They have no history of this event. They don't know what to expect. They will have officers there. The event itself without the mass reunion is typically benign. The officers can handle what will be there unless an enormous amount of people show up. He's never seen problems at any of the 3rd Friday events. The City covers the expense on Main Street events. This is outside of the PD's budget. Commissioner Norwood asked how they are covering the event if it's not in the budget. Chief Getchell said it's covered under overtime. Commissioner Norwood said they need to pay attention to the budget. They were told in September this was a very tight budget year. Per the question, Matt Reynolds, Finance Director, said there is around \$80,000 in contingency at this time. They also have reserves as well, and this is what has been dropping every year.

Mayor Myers said this will fill up the hotels and restaurants in the community, and will result in economic activity in the community. The people attending are not going to be rowdy drunks; these are mature adults. He doesn't believe this is destructive to the community. Chief Getchell said he feels confident that they can handle anything that comes up. If things get out of hand, they can move to Plan B. They are prepared to handle any event from this to bank robberies. They should be able to handle this.

Sharon Buck, 610 South 14th Street, said she knows there are at least 60 people from her class that plan on attending this event. As for area hotels, during her class reunion this past October only four couples stayed at hotels. There won't be a huge impact on hotels. She's hearing they are expecting 300 to 400 people. She asked how many people that area can hold? And where on the Riverfront would a line be drawn to prevent people from bringing alcohol out from that area? She asked if there would be any major spill out from this. Mayor Myers said this is not a rowdy crowd.

Betsy Driggers, 102 Canal Drive, E. Palatka, spoke in favor of the event, saying she, her brother and sisters have all booked hotel rooms for this event; she understands the hotels are filling up for it and all have offered block room rates for those attending.

Commissioner Leary moved to approve Consent Agenda Item 3 (h), special request items for Special Events Permit No. 13-17, Outdoor Movie Event on April 20, to allow sales/consumption of alcoholic beverages and permission to exceed allowable noise levels per permit specifications. Commissioner Norwood seconded the motion, which passed three in favor, opposed by Commissioner Kitchens.

7. **ORDINANCE** amending Chapter 94 of the Zoning Code of Ordinances to allow temporary outdoor sales in C-2 Zoning Districts – 2nd Reading, Adopt – The Clerk read an ordinance entitled AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PALATKA, FLORIDA, AMENDING CHAPTER 94 OF THE ZONING CODE OF ORDINANCES TO ALLOW NON-TEMPORARY OUTDOOR DISPLAY OF GOODS IN COMMERCIAL ZONING DISTRICTS AND NON-TEMPORARY OUTDOOR SALES AS A PRINCIPAL USE IN THE C-2 ZONING DISTRICT WITH REQUIRED DEVELOPMENT AND DESIGN STANDARDS, PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE. Commissioner Leary moved to pass the ordinance on second reading for adoption. Commissioner Norwood seconded the motion. There being no comments from the public, and no further discussion, a roll-call vote was taken, which yielded the following results: Commissioners Kitchens, Leary, Norwood and Mayor Myers, Yes; Nays, none. The Ordinance was declared passed and adopted on second reading.
8. **ORDINANCE** amending Palatka Municipal Code Sections 94-161 & 94-162 providing for additional accessory uses in Downtown zoning districts – 2nd Reading, Adopt – The Clerk read an ordinance entitled AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PALATKA, FLORIDA, PROVIDING ADDITIONAL ACCESSORY USES IN DOWNTOWN ZONING DISTRICTS, CONTAINED WITHIN ZONING CODE SECTION 94-161 AND 94-162; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE. Commissioner Norwood moved to pass the ordinance on second reading for adoption. Commissioner Leary seconded the motion. There being no comments from the public, and no further discussion, a roll-call vote was taken, which yielded the following results: Commissioners Leary, Norwood and Mayor Myers, Yes; Commissioner Kitchens, No. The Ordinance was declared passed and adopted on second reading three in favor, opposed by Commissioner Kitchens.

9. **CITY MANAGER & ADMINISTRATIVE REPORTS**

Mr. Czymbor said there are several RFP's out now and several more to come, so there will be several recommendations on a myriad of projects in the near future. He can send an e-mail out containing those various projects.

Mr. Czymbor said City Staff will be meeting with the Blue Crab Festival committee and will be making recommendations to improve that Festival. The Special Events committee has been looking at amendments to the Special Events ordinance, and those will be coming back to the Commission for consideration at a future meeting.

Mr. Czymbor said the rededication of the old Terminal Building at the Airport, which has been renovated and is now the W-4 building is scheduled for March 6 at noon.

Mayor Myers said the Azalea Festival Mayor's Reception is scheduled for Friday night, March 1 at the Bronson Mulholland House. It's a nice event and he hopes it will be well attended.

10. **COMMISSIONER COMMENTS**

Commissioner Kitchens noted the Palatka Women's Club's Azalea pre-sale is going on now; orders are being taken for delivery. Ms. Driggers said there is information on this on the bulletin board in City Hall and here are order forms on the Water Desk. The City is not actually taking those orders, but they can be left here or given to any Woman's Club representative.

Commissioner Kitchens said when she was elected she said she would do what the citizens asked her to do regardless of her personal opinions. When she votes 'no' on an item, it is because she has been contacted by citizens asking her to vote no. They as Commissioners are the voice of the people.

Commissioner Leary said they had a great meeting of the Golf Course Advisory Committee. The Board asked that the city re-evaluate the sale of alcohol on Sunday morning as it applies to the Golf Course. They had 140 rounds yesterday, 135 rounds today, and things are turning around. If they can get a high-quality restaurant operation in there it will help to further turn things around. He asked the City look at the issue of Sunday alcohol sales with respect to the Golf Course at the March 14 meeting.

Commissioner Leary said when they talk about a majority of citizens, if they were to talk to a majority of citizens, they'd have to talk to more than 5,000 people.

Commissioner Norwood asked if the trails are open in Palatka, specifically the Main Street segment. Mr. Griffith said some sections of the trail are not yet open to the public; some sections are not yet completed. Commissioner Norwood said he sees lots of cars still parking on Main Street. Mayor Myers said that will take some education.

Commissioner Kitchens clarified that the majority she was speaking of she is speaking the majority of citizens who voted for her. She represents the majority of the several hundred people who voted for her.
